We can support you to understand this perspective, but we will not make excuses or change what we know works to suit personally held views or values. All parents need to trust the judgment and professionalism of the staff of the School to deliver the unique learning environment that sets Haileybury Almaty apart from other Schools.

Above all, it is important to note that parents and the School want the same outcome for the pupils – happy, healthy, responsible and successful young people.

Parent contact with School

The School works to keep our community well informed of the events surrounding Haileybury Almaty and their children.

Class Teachers and House Tutors are your main line of communication, and they play a central role in your child's School life. The progress of each pupil at the School is carefully monitored by them and they serve as an important link person between School and home, looking after the overall welfare of the pupil.

In the Junior School, all routine correspondence in the first instance should be directed to your child's Class Teacher. Should your correspondence be of a more serious nature please contact your child's Head of Year who will follow up on this matter and report back to you and your child, please contact one of the Junior School Assistant Heads who may refer to the Head of Junior School.

In the Senior School all routine correspondence in the first instance should be directed to your child's House Tutor. Should your correspondence be of a more serious nature, please contact your child's Housemasters/Housemistressess. House Tutors and Housemasters/Housemistressess will be able to direct your correspondence to the most appropriate person and they will follow up on the issue with you and your child. Should your correspondence be of a more serious nature, please contact the Deputy Head Pastoral for pastoral matters or the Deputy Head Academic for academic matters.

Senior Leadership Team

Who to talk to?

Haileybury Almaty values the feedback it receives from parents and the community. Responding to feedback demonstrates the School's commitment to open communication with the School community and the community at large. Feedback about any aspect of the School's operations, service or personnel will be handled responsively, openly and in a timely manner, with the aim of resolving any complaint via an articulated process and respecting the confidential nature of such matters. Concerns are treated as constructive suggestions, which may be used to improve standards and may prevent cause for further complaint.

Haileybury Almaty acknowledges that concerns and issues exist that may be resolved informally without the need to

follow a formal procedure. In such cases parents are encouraged initially to raise issues or concerns informally with the relevant person, the Class Teacher or House Tutor in the first instance, at the time of the issue arising. Discussing the issue or concern immediately and face-toface may clarify the situation and resolve any misunderstandings satisfactorily. In the event that this does not resolve the issue, parents should then contact the relevant Senior Staff Member. Should a complaint be made against the Headmaster this complaint should be put in writing and addressed to the Chairman of the Governors.

School security and safety





The School strives to offer the highest level of security and safety for our pupils, community and visitors to Haileybury Almaty.

When visiting the campus, all parents/ guardians must sign in at the appropriate entrance, sign the safeguarding statement and wear their parent badge, clearly visible, before entering the School building. As a courtesy, and for security reasons, it is vital that the appropriate staff member/s are informed of an intended visit. All visitors are asked to sign out.

Parents are permitted into the main reception area, and the reception areas in the Junior School. Unless invited specifically by staff, parents are not permitted into classroom corridors or other areas of the School facility. It is important that parents do not disturb the lessons or learning of the pupils during School hours. Parents are welcome to come to the School and support their children in organised games, sports or other activities by invitation only.

There are bathroom facilities for visitors in the main reception area. Visitors are not allowed to use pupils' bathroom facilities.

Vehicles bringing children to School

and collecting them should park in the designated areas only and at all times should drive slowly and be vigilant of the safety of pedestrians. The flow of traffic around the campus is strictly managed to ensure the safety of the pupils.

On arrival at the School driveway, cars containing only Senior School pupils MUST turn left before the traffic barriers and park in lower car park. Senior School pupils can then enter via Gate 7, and walk along (not across) the Astro turf into the School. Cars containing Junior School pupils may continue up the driveway to the parking area behind the School, either to park, or return back down to the School to either of the two 'drop off' points by the Junior School Entrance, and the Main Entrance. If the traffic barrier is closed, cars must park in the Lower car park.

All vehicle access to the campus is strictly monitored and controlled. Vehicles found to be speeding or being driven without care will be prohibited from entry to the campus in the future.

All visitors are expected to respect the School's no-smoking policy. Smoking is strictly prohibited on the School site.



Safeguarding policy and guidelines

Haileybury Almaty takes seriously its responsibility to safeguard and promote the welfare of children. This refers to the process of protecting children from maltreatment, preventing the impairment of health or development, ensuring that children grow up in circumstances consistent with the provision of safe and protective care, and taking action to enable all children to have the best outcomes. Listening to children and to all members of the community is fundamental to safeguarding and is in the best interest of the child. Haileybury Almaty is committed to a 'speak up culture' and strongly believes that if concerns are raised early intervention can help to keep the child safe.

At Haileybury Almaty we recognise that all adults, including teachers, House Tutors, Housemasters/Housemistresses, administrative staff, volunteers, temporary staff and Governors, have a full and active part to play in protecting our pupils from harm, and that the child's welfare is our paramount concern. All staff at Haileybury Almaty commit to providing a caring, positive, safe and stimulating environment that promotes the social, physical and moral development of the individual child. At Haileybury Almaty we strongly believe that safer children make more successful learners. English speaking environment

Haileybury Almaty is an English-speaking environment.

The staff and pupils try extremely hard to preserve this key protocol in the School for two important reasons:

- With pupils from many different nationalities attending the School, English is the common language of communication.
- Many pupils at Haileybury have English as a second or additional language.

It is vital that they are given every opportunity to practise this language whilst inside the School gates.

We expect all staff to speak English in public spaces, especially whilst pupils are in the vicinity. We expect parents to do their best to help us preserve the Englishspeaking environment.

Social media

Haileybury Almaty works hard to educate our pupils in the correct and proper use of social media including WhatsApp and our rules and guidance for pupils are clearly explained in the School's Acceptable Use of ICT Policy which is found on the website.

To ensure correct and proper use by anyone (including adults) in the Haileybury Almaty community, we would like to draw your attention to three broad points about the use of social media.

1. Haileybury Almaty has clear procedures on how to communicate issues about the School: contacting the House Tutor, Class Teacher, or via the Academic Support Staff in both Schools (Staff who can translate are provided to support effective communication). Haileybury Almaty will not respond to complaints raised via social media.

- 2. The use of social media to post negative or derogatory comments about a pupil, or any member of the community, is inappropriate and may be considered bullying. Haileybury Almaty takes such matters seriously and those found to be offending in this way risk exclusion.
- 3. Any post on social media that brings the good standing or reputation of the School into disrepute is not appropriate. Again, Haileybury Almaty takes such matters seriously and those found to be offending in this way risk exclusion.

We hope that you understand the need for everyone in the School community to provide a strong example to the children, so that they may learn to use new technologies in a way that promotes harmony and inclusion.





New parent tips-preparation for life at Haileybury Almaty

Our philosophy of education is based on a strong partnership between School and family. Success for your child will depend on the support structures in both at home and at School. Below are a few tips on how you can support your child's transition in Haileybury Almaty:

- Model positive attitudes and confidence in the School and in your child's capacity to cope and thrive. Parent confidence can promote confidence and trust in the safety of their learning environment.
- Be excited! Physiologically, excitement and fear are indistinguishable from each other – so reframe fears as excitement: be excited that your child is beginning a challenging adventure that you trust is in their best interest. Be excited that your child is going to grow in maturity, independence and confidence. Additionally, your child is embarking on an exciting journey that will lead them on a pathway that will see them become leaders of the future!
- The concept of 'settling in' should be raised and your child reassured that this is a normal part of life experienced by all pupils, both old and new. Realise the 'settling in' process will not end in Term 1. It may reappear at the start of each term, but the extent of this will diminish with time.
- If parents have any special concerns about their child they should let staff know. You can also call and discuss any concerns with Mr Pandya, the School's Designated Safeguarding Lead d.pandya@haileyburyalmaty.kz

Attendance

Good School attendance is central to raising pupil achievement and ensures all pupils can fulfil their potential – pupils need to attend School regularly and with minimal disruption if they are to flourish.

Parents must play a central role by ensuring their children attend School regularly and arrive to School on time, properly dressed and equipped. Regular attendance at School is vitally important for the success of your child's progress and achievement.

There are a number of important steps that parents can take to ensure their son/daughter maintains a high level of attendance:

- Ensure their child attends every day, on time, equipped and ready to learn. School starts at 8.00 so pupils should be in School by 7.30am.
- Ensure the School has up-to-date email addresses and telephone numbers.
- Parents should respond to School letters or telephone calls regarding attendance and punctuality
- Parents should contact their child's Class Teacher/ House Tutor if they are experiencing difficulty in getting their child to School.

The following are guidelines for parents on how to report an absence to the School:

Unplanned absence:

If your son/daughter is absent from the School, it is vital that the School is informed at the earliest opportunity. Please directly email your child's Class Teacher (Junior School) or House Tutor (Senior School). Alternatively, please contact the Main Reception desk and provide your child's name, their Class Teacher/House Tutor and the reason for the absence:

If no contact is received regarding the absence, it is recorded as 'unauthorised'.

All absences of this nature will result in a phone call home to query the nature of the absence. In cases of illness, pupil records will be updated accordingly. Parents should communicate with the School each day that a pupil is absent because of illness. We would normally ask that you provide a medical certificate for any absence more than 3 days in duration.

Planned absence:

Leave of absence during the day - the process

If a child in the Junior School needs to leave the School during the day the following needs to happen:

Parent to email your child's Class Teacher with the reason for the absence at least 24 hours in advance. The School will then agree the absence and email Reception with the authorisation and approval for the child to leave School through the Main entrance. We have a right to decline a request if the absence is not for a valid reason. Medical appointments should, whenever possible, be made outside normal School hours. If this is unavoidable then parents should inform the School as soon as possible once the appointment has been confirmed following the procedure above. These include dentist, doctor or specialists appointments. Preparation for external examinations should be done during the holidays or weekend. Note that there are more days off School than we have in School in any given year.

Overseas visits to Schools for interviews should also be organised for School holidays so that disruption to the child's Schooling is kept to a minimum. Absences due to these tests or visits are strongly discouraged and will be recorded as 'unauthorised absences' which will affect the pupil's attendance record and be published in the end of term and annual School report. If a child in the Senior School needs to leave the School:

 Parent to email your child's House Tutor and Housemaster/Housemistress with the reason for the absence at least 24 hours in advance.

2. Their Housemaster/Housemistress will then go ahead and complete an Exit Slip if the request is authorised. The School will of course decline a request if the absence is not valid.

3. Pupil then collects the Exit Slip from their Housemaster/ Housemistress and shows this to the Main Reception

Medical appointments should, whenever possible, be made outside normal School hours. If this is unavoidable then parents should inform the School as soon as possible once the appointment has been confirmed. These include dentist, doctor or specialists appointments.

Preparation for external examinations such as SAT, IELTS, TOEFL, SSAT should be done during the holidays or weekend. Note that there are more days off School than we have in School in any given year. Overseas visits to Schools for interviews should also be organised for School holidays so that disruption to the child's Schooling is kept to a minimum. Absences due to these tests or visits are strongly discouraged and will be recorded as 'unauthorised absences' which will affect the pupil's attendance record.





Co-curricular activities (CCAs)

Co-curricular activities take place after School from Monday to Thursday.

We encourage all pupils to participate in a range of Physical, Creative, Cognitive and Service CCAs across the year.

Some of the activities offered across the School include: cross-country running, jazz band, rock climbing, pupil magazines, tennis, touch rugby, yoga, DJ club, international award, musical theatre club, ukulele club, chess, choirs, community outreach, orchestra, cooking, dance, golf, debating, drama clubs, environmental club, Kazakh art and painting, psychology club and martial arts; as well as the chance for pupils to train and practise for School teams, musical. ensembles and drama productions.









House is at the centre of the School's pastoral structure. Houses afford the pupil a smaller, closer community within the School, and broaden the range of activities and support available to the pupils. Each House is led by a Housemaster or Housemistress who leads a team of House Tutors / Class Teachers across the Junior School (Reception to Year 6) and Senior School (Year 7 to Year 13). Housemaster/Housemistress are responsible for leading the pastoral, academic and holistic development of each pupil in their House. Each Housemaster/Housemistress manages the planning and strategic direction of a particular aspect of each pupil's development. In the Junior School each pupil plays an active role in their House and the Housemasters/Housemistresses plays a leading role in their holistic development but the class teacher remains at the centre of each pupil's pastoral and academic development.

The day-to-day management of pupils in the Junior School, the Class Teacher is the first port of call and in the Senior School the House Tutor is the first port of call but more serious incidents should be reported to the appropriate Housemaster. All incidents and concerns will be recorded on iSAMS so that each day the Housemaster can review and monitor the progress and wellbeing of the pupils within their House.

The School is divided vertically into four Houses: Attlee, Bartle Frere, Edmonstone, and Kipling.

Upon enrolment, every pupil is assigned to their House within the School and they remain a member of the same House for the duration of their time at Haileybury Almaty. As members of the respective Houses, pupil uniform will include a House tie and House t-shirt, which should be which should be worn during House events.

Housemasters/Housemistresses implement a range of House events and activities across the year to support the Personal Development of the pupils such as:

- Sports Day
- Charity Events
- Music Events
- Academic Competitions

Points are awarded to the Houses for winning competitions and at the end of each academic year, the number of points accumulated by each House is counted and the winning House celebrated.

Each House also has House Captains and pupils with leadership responsibilities. These pupils assist the Housemasters/Housemistresses with the coordination and organisation of pupil participation in House events.









Medical, Health and Health Centre procedures

It is our School policy to promote a safe and supportive environment for all pupils. Our pastoral care processes are carefully designed and reviewed regularly to provide support and care for all pupils. Support staff and selected academic staff have regular first aid training. We have a designated Health Centre in the School which can be accessed by pupils as needed for first aid treatment.

Medical information on all pupils is required annually from parents/guardians in order that the School appropriately caters for pupils during normal School activities. Additional information will be sought for particular participation in excursions and trips. New health problems, any changes to condition, medication or special requirements must be given to the School immediately.



The School Health Centre

The School Health Centre is located at the side of the Junior School Atrium. Full details concerning the Health Centre and the monitoring of the health of pupils at Haileybury Almaty is contained in the Health Centre Protocols and Procedures Manual available from the Health Centre and Guidelines for School Nurses and School Doctors are also available from the Health Centre. These policies and procedures are based on UK guidelines for health provision within Schools, but meet Kazakhstan guidelines.

The School Health Centre is staffed by a fully qualified doctor and nurse. Pupils can visit the Health Centre if required whenever they are at the School.



During the admission process to the School, all parents complete the Medical Health Record and Immunisation form for their child. This gives us essential information on your child's health needs to ensure they can be met. This form also provides information on whom the Health Centre may call if your child becomes unwell in School. We ask that should your child's health status, or your emergency contact details change you contact the School Health Centre.

As a School we exclude all pupils who have a high temperature (temperature above 37.5 degrees Celsius) or gastric symptoms and ask that they remain at home until they have been free of symptoms for 48 hours without medication. This reduces the risks of these infections being passed onto others. There are also specific exclusions for common infective childhood illness such as Hand, Foot and Mouth disease. If this occurs we send out letters to the specific year groups affected reminding parents to be vigilant.

The teachers will bring pupils into the Health Centre if they have any indications they are becoming unwell, or when they are injured. The Health Centre will carry out any necessary first aid and then contact home if the child requires the parent to take the child to receive medical attention from a doctor or hospital. If your child is seen in the Health Centre for first aid treatment they will receive a note to bring home informing you of the reason they visited.

In the case of an injury to their head parents will be contacted immediately.



The Health Centre does not stock any over the counter medicines. If your child has been ill and requires medication, the only medicines brought in from home that the Health Centre will administer are medicines prescribed by a doctor. These must be in the original container with the instructions clearly visible and a parental agreement form completed. Parental agreement forms can be provided by the School medical team.

Families are encouraged to meet with the Health Centre Staff for any specific health needs that you as a family would like to bring to the attention of the School staff.

Please contact the Health Centre if you have any concerns, or would like to update them with new information.

ICT and communicating with Haileybury Almaty



When a child joins Haileybury Almaty, parents will be given log in details to the Parent Portal. Both pupils and parents will have to bring their devices such as laptops and phones to the ICT department in School in order to be able to access the Wi-Fi in School and the portals. We will also show you how to acquire the app so that you can access this portal on your mobile phone.

Haileybury Almaty is working towards being 'paperless' in its communication with parents and so in our introductory guide we will show parents how they can access all communications from the School including reports. Parents will also have access to the School's learning platform which enables parents to find out about their child's curriculum, timetable and homework set. We run an extensive Co-curricular activities programme and through our online calendar parents can see School trips, events, fixtures and then sign up for these activities for their child.

School policies

School Shop/ Purchasing

Haileybury Almaty believes that the School uniform is a clear indicator of the high standards, which the School seeks to instil in its students. Furthermore, the School acknowledges the view supported by a majority of parents that a uniform prevents competition over high-fashion clothing. Every pupil at Haileybury Almaty is expected to wear the full School uniform when attending School, or when participating in School-organised events outside of normal School hours.

Aims and objectives

The School policy on uniform is based on the notion that it:

- Promotes a sense of pride in the School;
- Engenders a sense of community and belonging towards the School;
- Is practical and smart;

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- Identifies the pupils with the School;
- Prevents pupils from coming to School in clothes that could be distracting during lessons;
- Allows pupils to feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance;
- Is designed with health and safety in mind.









The School uniform

School uniform can be purchased from the School Shop and our outlet in Esentai Mall. The tables that follow outline the uniform requirements for pupils of each year for both the summer (summer term to October half term) and winter months (October half term to spring term). The blazer, shirt, trousers/skirt and tie have all been tailored specifically for Haileybury Almaty and the tie and blazer bear the Haileybury crest. There is also a comprehensive Sports Uniform that all pupils must obtain and wear during P.E. lessons and sporting events which also features the Haileybury crest.

Haileybury Almaty is divided into 4 Houses: Kipling, Edmonstone, Bartle Frere and Attlee. All pupils are required to have purchased a Haileybury Almaty House t-shirt from the School Shop and pupils from Year 3 and above will also require a House tie. The colours of these will depend on which House they belong to.

Expectations

Haileybury Almaty appreciates that young people need to express their individual tastes and styles but has the following restrictions in place as part of this policy:

• Extreme fashion, whether in clothing

or shoes (as per the expectations of the Head)

- No longer than collar length hair for boys (as per the expectations of the Head) that is neat, tidy and that does not hang over the eyes
- Hair that is coloured and changed in an unnatural way according to the Head
- Girls in Year 7 11 with hair that is deemed by the School to be longer than collar length must be tied back
- Inappropriate jewellery, make-up and nail varnish as per the expectations of the Head
- All Senior School pupils must be wearing their security badge on a School lanyard at all times

Consequently, pupils who do not adhere to the School's policy on uniform will be considered to be failing to meet expectations and therefore followed up according to the Behaviour, Rewards and Consequences policy. The School expects full support from the parents and reserves the right to send pupils that are dressed inappropriately back home to make the necessary adjustments.

The School serves breakfast and lunch for all pupils. Both breakfasts and lunches are balanced and low in processed carbohydrates and fat. There is a fair choice of Western, Kazakh and vegetarian options together with soup, salads and desserts, including fresh fruits.

Eating together is an important part of the culture of the School and there are formal occasions when the whole School shares lunch in celebration of British, local and international festivals.

Pupils are not allowed to bring their own food into School as we ensure that we meet the dietary requirements of all pupils and take account of pupils with allergies.

Parent Partnership Programme

Extensive research shows that parental involvement in their children's education has a very significant positive influence on exam results and behaviour. In fact, it is a more important indicator of success than the family's economic background. As a result of this, Haileybury Almaty has developed the Parent Partnership Programme. This scheme is based on the national standards from the United States according to a model developed by Professor Joyce Epstein from Johns Hopkins University. The Parent Partnership Programme encourages parents to be involved in the School in six different areas:

Parental Training, Learning at Home, Communication, Collaborating with Community, Volunteering and Decision Making for Pupil Success.

Senior School Reporting and Assessment Schedule

1. Parents' Days

Parents' Days in the Senior School are held throughout year. You will be able to discuss your son/daughter's progress at these events with their subject teachers, House Tutors and Housemasters/Housemistresses.

Induction Meetings for parents, for pupils in all year groups, are held at the start of the Autumn Term and this is the opportunity to meet your son/daughter's House Tutor and Housemasters/Housemistresses.

There are also academic information evening for parents with pupils which provide information and guidance on future academic career paths. E.g. selecting the correct iGCSE option choices.

2. Grade Cards

We believe that it is important to provide regular information on your son/daughter's attainment and effort levels in each of the subjects they study. To maintain good communication with parents, Grade Cards will be completed by individual subject teachers and will be made available to parents via the Parent Portal. As much as possible, parents should expect to see one Grade Sheet per Half Term. We would appreciate feedback from parents as to the usefulness or otherwise of the information we provide in this manner. Pupils in public examination years do not receive Grade Cards in the Summer Term.

3. Reports

Each pupil receives one full written report per year. This will contain comments from your son/daughter's subject teachers, outlining current performance and target areas for future development. The House Tutor will also write a report summarising the salient points of the academic report and reporting themselves on your son/daughter's pastoral and extra-curricular progress.

4. School Examinations
